Extensive property presents challenges

Miller awaits city, state negotiations

STAUNTON — The vision is a village. A community within the historic Staunton community, featuring residential space, commercial offices, retail and hospitality, including hotels and restaurants across 84 acres. It would be the first development of its kind in Staunton.

Robin Miller of Miller and Associates is eager to tackle the former Western State property, calling it "an enormous project with incredible challenges." Located at Richmond Road and Greenville Avenue, the property is an eye-catcher, spread on rolling hills at downtown's entrance with 34 buildings and an historic cemetery.

Miller and Associates selected by the city in June is part of a three-company team, along with The Folsom

But at the moment, Miller can only mark time. "We're ready to go as soon as we can arrive at an acceptable price from the state in selling it to the city," Miller said.

He's hoping it will take weeks, not months, but he's prepared. "My guess is it will take two to three months before we have a legally binding contract that Staunton works out with the state."

Until then, Miller said he's not
