STAUNTON - Under the cozy lighting of Devine Decor, downtown businesses owners gathered to hear the latest happenings in their work neighborhood.

Sipping on drinks, munching and browsing the home decor store, owners caught up with each other, then listened to Economic Development Director Bill Hamilton update them on the growth of historic downtown.

oper for the Towne Centre and a developer on the former Western State property project.

Miller expressed his readiness to tackle the former Western State property, which is envisioned to be a village with residential space, commercial offices, retail and hospitality. including hotels and restaurants.

Until the bill is finished going through its process in Rich-

mond, Miller can't begin work. But he said he has started on plans for one building on the property and the city has agreed to run the trolley through the

community once it's done. Miller announced that he decided on the name "Old Y Lofts" for the condominiums, which will total 20 - 18 residential and two commercial.

Prices haven't been finalized.

Miller said, but his early estimates ranged from \$200,000 to more than \$400,000.

"The demolition is almost finished," and should be done in about two to three weeks. Miller said.

News of the condos has inquiries rolling in.

"We're getting inquiries almost by the day," Miller said. "We've gotten now at least 25

names of prospective buyers." "We're going to talk to those folks first before we officially go

on the market." Business After Hours quarterly meetings started three years ago, Staunton Downtown Development Director Kimber-

ly Watters said. She said it's a good chance for business owners to get to

know each other and catch up. "This is just a casual, relaxed way for them to do that." Wat-

ters said.
